

OID

Object Identifier.

The describing entity of a place. A universally unique identifier.

This identifier is, in conceptual contrast to names, **always** choosen automatically. (TODO refer to (german) tax law's archival demands and others)

TODO oid's are "endpoint references" in the sense if web service addressing;

Furthermore OID's are self-certifying identifiers. The OID value allows to verify that the so called deed-slots have never been tampered with.

Rationale behind those deed-slots: creator, date and body are exactly the same as for paper documents. (see also "self archiving") For processes we need to ascertain the behaviour in time, the action-document. The equivalent of certificates (as in "paper") is a special case of such a process: the constant process, which raises an exception for any kind of modification attempt. NamespaceDSSSL there's a function public-place we're using for that purpose.
